Areas of specialization include disorders of developmental language, neurogenic speech and language, fluency, voice, articulation/phonology, swallowing, and alternative and augmentative communication."

What are the common academic requirements for SLP programs?

4-year Bachelor degree from a recognized university
Minimum mid-B (3.0 GPA) average in the final 1-2 years of full-time study; meeting the minimum does not guarantee admission due to the competitiveness of applications
5-6 prerequisites in areas such as child development, linguistics, phonetics, statistics/research design, human physiology, life science, social science, and psychology
Clinical volunteer or paid experience working with a registered speech language pathologist

Start Early!

SLP programs require a minimum B average. Many look for demonstrated interest in SLP on your application.

Improve your GPA: Visit the AA&CC and the Centre for Teaching & Learning to improve your academic skills.

Cultivate References: Get to know your professors. Their research is interesting! Professors who know you fairly well are able to write strong reference letters for you.

Get Involved: Gain volunteer experiences that demonstrate your skills and ongoing interest in a career in SLP.
